## FROM THE COORDINATOR An RNet Church Plant Story

I just returned from a visit to Conway, South Carolina, where a group of daring mighty men and women are seeking to plant a 1689 Reformed Baptist church about a dozen miles from Myrtle Beach. For years, the Lord has been conceiving and mobilizing this noble vision by creating a hunger and thirst for truth in the hearts of these would-be founders. Each testimony story is unique, but also common, as spiritual growth and exposure to ministries like Grace to You, Ligonier, Desiring God, 9 Marks, etc., along with the Scriptures, grew them independently into a holy dissatisfaction with churches that more conform to the world than to the Word.



The leaders of the hungry band contacted Grace Baptist Church in Taylors (Greenville, SC), and shared their mind to plant. Pastors Mark Hatfield and Jamie Howell responded with open arms by inviting the band to a late November 2020 weekend at Grace where literature and counsel and spirit-filled worship was on tap. They returned back to Conway with a holy vision before them, and an established church behind them.

Having met in homes, they now began the hunt for a building to rent, and the Lord provided a handsome facility that can seat almost 100. Rivertown Grace Fellowship <https://rivertowngrace.org/> meets Sundays at 10:30 a.m. for worship. They're working their way through the 1689 Confession, pouring concrete and steel into the foundation. Let's pray that the Carpenter from Nazareth would wisely constitute them soon, and that this kind of RNet church-planting would be replicated all around the country, where hunger is reaching epidemic levels. 🙏

## MISSION THOUGHTS

### Line Item Missionaries

Is your missionary more than a line item? I surmise that many churches would give a hearty "YES"!

What does a "line item" missionary look like? There may be several answers to this question.

A missionary like this may be one of many missionaries supported by a particular church. The church supports so many missionaries for such small amounts that the congregation is not able to keep up with each missionary. The saints, if asked, might say something like this, "Well I know the name and I think he ministers in Africa." But if asked further the member would not be able to give any more details. The problem is that the church has spread herself so thin in missionary support that it is not possible to be closely involved with any one of her gospel laborers.

A missionary like this may be one who is supported by a missions-minded church and even gives a lot of money for support but the missionary is not brought up regularly for prayer. So once again there is ignorance among the saints and a lack of real connection with the missionary.

A missionary like this may be one who fails to communicate regularly with the supporting churches. The saints are unaware of the prayer needed because there is a lack of communication. There are not very many missionaries in this category, but occasionally it does happen.

How can a church avoid having missionaries that are merely line items? Just a couple of suggestions:

First the church needs to be able to communicate to the entire congregation regularly the needs of all the missionaries she supports.

Secondly, the church needs to have the missionary reporting regularly. With today's technology this can happen not only by personal visits but also via the internet or even regular missionary conferences. 🙏
